Funding Source:

The Educational Talent Search Program is funded 100% by the United States Department of Education

Scholarship Opportunities: Students who are eligible and participate in program activities may qualify for the TRIO scholarships based on academic achievement and academic improvement. Additionally students and parent/guardians are provided with information on financial aid eligibility and application.

Programmatic Objectives:

- A. Secondary School Promotion: 90% of non-seniors secondary school participants served during each budget period will be promoted to the next grade level at the end of each academic year.
- B. Secondary School Graduation: 95% of high school seniors (and their equivalents in alternative education programs) will graduate from secondary school or receive a certificate of high school equivalency during each budget period.
- C. Student Financial Aid: 100% of "college ready" project participants will apply for financial aid during each budget period.
- D. Application for postsecondary education admission: 75% of "college ready" project participants will apply for postsecondary school admission during each budget period.
- E. Post secondary education enrollment: 75% of "college ready" participants will apply for financial aid during each budget period.
- F. Postsecondary placements (types of institutions)

The role of Educational Talent Search is to provide low-income, first-generation, and academic in-need students an opportunity to have equal access to educational opportunities that will improve their lives as well as the community in which they reside.

Partnerships: The Talent Search Program works very closely with the secondary academic staff principals, teachers, and counselors. Talent Search has successfully established partnerships with

Outreach and Civic Engagement Program to provide tutoring to eligible program participants. Additionally, partnering with the 21st Century Programs and the International Bachelorette Program have expanded our outreach to students within the community. Continuing to work with MSU Admissions and Financial Aid and alternative higher educational institutions only serves to enhance the educational opportunities available to our student populations.
