

MIPA Summer **Journalism Workshop** July 28-Aug. 2, 2012

Audience

The Michigan Interscholastic Press Association Summer Journalism Workshop annually brings middle and high school students from across the region to MSU for a fourday residential program. Enrollment is open to any student interested in journalism. The 2012 program included:

- 368 students
- Participants from four states:
 - Illinois: 15 (4 percent)
 - Maryland: 1 (0.2 percent)
 - Ohio: 34 (9 percent)
 - Michigan: 316 (86 percent)
- Gender:
 - 287 female students (78 percent)
 - 81 male students (22 percent)
- Participant grade level:
 - 7th: 1 (0.2 percent)
 - 8th: 7 (2 percent)
 - 9th: 7 (2 percent)
 - 10th: 25 (7 percent)
 - 11th: 131 (36 percent) 12th: 195 (53 percent)

Funding

The summer workshop is funded by participant registration fees. Rates for 2012 were \$425 for students at MIPA member schools and out-of-state schools and \$465 for students at Michigan schools that were not MIPA members.

- Several scholarships are available:
 - Michigan Press Association Foundation scholarship for five Michigan students interested in newspapers
 - Detroit Free Press scholarships for six minority students from Detroit Public Schools; the MSU School of Journalism provided full scholarships for two Detroit Public Schools students who worked with the Free Press' high school program
 - MIPA funds one scholarship for a student editor
 - MIPA provides up to two full scholarships for students at schools with new student media outlets. No applicants applied in 2012.
 - The Owosso Argus-Press donated \$2,000 to match money raised by students toward registration.

Objectives

Objectives vary based on the course enrolled, but all workshop activities share these common goals:

- Introduce students to the basic principles of journalism
- Advance student journalism by improving the quality of student media outlets and teaching students the skills they need to produce journalism that matters
- Build leadership skills that allow students to successfully manage school media outlets
- Teach students how to use technology to gather and disseminate news
- Encourage appreciation of the First Amendment and instill in students an understanding of the responsibilities of journalists



Description

Students spent four days living on campus in Snyder-Phillips Hall and participating in one of 26 intensive courses on journalism topics.

- Students participate in 27 hours of instructional contact time and a 1-hour voluntary information session on MSU and its journalism-related activities.
- 26 faculty members recruited from across the nation
- Paid support staff included 12 MSU students

Outcomes

- 94 percent of students say they would recommend the course they took
- 83 percent of students rated their class, on a 1-10 scale, as an 8 or higher; 98 percent rated their class as a 6 or higher
- 35 percent of students plan to return in 2013
- 49 percent of students are interested in pursuing journalism in college
- 47 percent of students are interested in attending MSU

Other MIPA Programs & Activities

MIPA also organizes programs for middle and high school journalism students and their teachers throughout the traditional K–12 school year. These activities include:

- **Fall Conference** (2,000 students and teachers)
- Middle School Conference (250 students and teachers)
- One-Day Workshop (100 students and teachers)
- **Spring Conference** (1,500 students and teachers)
- Contests
- Adviser Courses: MIPA works closely with the School of Journalism to promote graduate-level MSU courses designed for journalism educators.
